Trusting New Life: a Nepalese fable

Once upon a time, there was a very beautiful island covered with flowers and trees, streams and ponds. It was like heaven on earth, peaceful and serene. All the birds and animals lived together happily for many years. However, as time passed the environment changed, there were no rains in the rainy season, and everything dried up and died. The island had suffered severely from drought. So the animals and birds decided to leave and look for a new place to live. A couple of geese and a tortoise lived on the island. They were best friends. The geese decided to leave and the tortoise wanted to go with them but, of course, she couldn't fly. So she asked the geese to help her.

This posed quite a challenge for the geese but they were very kind and after some thought they came up with a solution. They found a long stick and told the tortoise of their plan. They would hold the stick in their beaks and then the tortoise would grip the stick tightly with her teeth. They warned her not to open her mouth at any cost - to hold on tight. They flew together away from the island and eventually reached a city. The people were amazed when they looked up and saw two geese and a tortoise flying above them and they called to their friends to come and see the strange sight in the sky. All the commotion below disturbed the tortoise and distracted her so that she forgot what she had to do, she opened her mouth, let go of the stick and, of course, fell to the ground.

The ending to this story could have been different.

New Testament Reading Luke 24:36b-48

Jesus Appears to His Disciples

Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.
