

Welcome and Introduction to the Theme: God Breathes New Life into Us

Welcome to this service coming to you from St. Andrew's and St. George's West Church here in the heart of Edinburgh on Pentecost Sunday. A warm welcome to those of you tuning in at home as well as to those of you physically present here in the sanctuary. Our theme on this Pentecost Sunday is 'God Breathes New Life into Us.' Nothing could be more basic than breathing. And during the pandemic we have become more aware than ever of the precious gift of breath. So before we come to our opening responses we are going to invite you to join in a breathing exercise which will be led for us by Sally.

"Take a deep breath" - it's a phrase we often hear when we need to cope with a tricky situation.

During the pandemic we've perhaps become more aware of our breathing, especially when we're behind our masks, in a public place or as we come out of lockdown. Articles in the press, the N.H.S. and mindfulness gurus advocate the health benefits of becoming more aware of our breathing.

Dr Rangan Chatterjee, the author and TV presenter says:

"Many of us spend too much time in fight-or flight mode and not enough in relaxation mode. I've come up with a simple exercise called **3-4-5** breathing.

It couldn't be easier. Just breathe in for three seconds, hold for four and then breathe out for five".

As we approach this Pentecost service let's focus on our breathing right now.

Sit comfortably with your feet flat on the floor about hip width apart

Now breathe in....2....3 Hold it2....3....4 Breathe out ...2....3....4....5.

In2....3 Hold2....3....4 Out2....3....4....5

Once more In2....3 Hold 2....3....4 Out2....3....4....5

Try doing this a few times a day, and even better in the open air, and you'll notice the benefits

Prayer and Breathing

Having taken part in a few guided prayer sessions during the course of the pandemic I have noticed that many of them begin with a focus on breathing as a way of stilling and

calming ourselves as we approach God in prayer. So as you sit at home or here in church I would invite you to become aware of your breathing. Focus on your body starting with your head, your face and your mouth......and moving down through your neck...... shoulders, arms wrists hands fingers Now your chest stomach thighsknees calves anklesand feet. As you breathe in, breathe in God's love for you. As you breathe out, let go and let God.

The Bible story of the coming of the Holy Spirit

as told in the Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 2 verses 1 – 21

¹ When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. ² And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. 4 All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. 5 Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶ And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. 7 Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? 8 And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? ⁹ Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, ¹¹ Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." 12 All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" 13 But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." ¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. 15 Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. ¹⁶ No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: ¹⁷ "In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. 18 Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. 19 And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. ²⁰ The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. 21 Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

Leader: Who is the spirit?

Sermon God Breathes New Life Into Us

After his baptism, while Jesus was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit came down upon him in bodily form like a dove. In this hymn the Holy Spirit is similarly likened to a bird.

Hymn She Sits Like a Bird *Verses 1 and 2.*

- 1 She sits like a bird, brooding on the waters, hovering on the chaos of the world's first day; she sighs and she sings, mothering creation, waiting to give birth to all the Word will say.
- 2 She wings over earth, resting where she wishes, lighting close at hand or soaring through the skies; she nests in the womb, welcoming each wonder, nourishing potential hidden to our eyes.

Spirit of life, fill us with your love

We pray for all who lead and give wise counsel. May they lead with justice and compassion, and build on a foundation of love.

Especially for the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland and every Commissioner meeting this week in Edinburgh; The Lord High Commissioner, Prince William; the outgoing Moderator the Right Reverend Dr. Martin Fair, and his successor Jim Wallace (Lord Wallace of Tankerness).

Especially we pray for the work of the Assembly Trustees and that the challenges set out in their report will help us to have the faith and the imagination needed to see and do things differently.

Spirit of life, fill us with your love

And we pray for all whom we know, struggling this day with loss, with disappointment, with illness, with bereavement, with lack of hope and purpose.

Spirit of God, breathe change through our hearts, our lives and our world. Amen.

Hymn She Sits Like a Bird Verses 3 and 4

- 3 She dances in fire, startling her spectators, waking tongues of ecstasy where dumbness reigned; she weans and inspires all whose hearts are open, nor can she be captured, silenced, or restrained.
- For she is the Spirit, one with God in essence, gifted by the Saviour in eternal love; and she is the key opening the scriptures, enemy of apathy and heavenly dove.
