Waiting for ...? Alistair McGregor

As I write this, our minister Ian Gilmour is on his sabbatical leave in Arizona and Arkansas in America, as he will be until 3rd November. So I am happy to write this as Interim Moderator in his absence and say in a very heartfelt way how much we are looking forward to his return.

Soon after he is back, at the end of November in fact, the season of Advent starts our build up to Christmas. Advent gets overlooked, even by the Church, because of the enormous publicity and marketing that surround Christmas. That's a pity. Because Advent is about waiting. And we can all learn from a time of waiting.

The trouble is that in our society we have now learnt – and now expect – that everything will come instantly. If it doesn't then it is not worth having. But in our saner moments we know that is not right.

Waiting!

What can we possibly learn from that?

Before the coming of Christ, waiting built up a sense of expectancy for the coming of the long awaited messiah. But for us, this Advent, there is still much to be said for these four weeks of waiting.

I would suggest we can learn three things.

First, Advent gives us a chance to think. What is Christmas really all about? God in Christ among us. Why such an amazing act by God? Which leads us on...

Second, to praise God for this, the greatest gift of all. And, thank God, there will be plenty of opportunities for worship in our church this Advent, as this magazine shows us.

And third, Advent tells us that there is hope, that with God all things **are** possible. We all need hope. We all have dark days. But Advent,

as we look forward and wait for Christmas and God's coming among us, tells us that really are new possibilities for the world, for Christ's Church and – yes – for us too. And that is well worth waiting for, and thinking about.

So as we all prepare for Christmas in the weeks ahead may we make space each day for Advent to thank God for the wonder that is about to come – however many Christmasses we have seen before! With my grateful thanks to you all, and every blessing.

SCOTS AND GERMANS UNITE TO HONOUR WAR DEAD

Sunday Express Reporter FOR the first time the congregations of a Scottish and a German church will hold a joint Remembrance S und a y service to pay homage to the dead of two world wars.

The service, which has been welcomed by churchmen, will be held at St. Andrews and St. Georges Church, in Edinburgh.

Members of the St. Andrews congregation will be joined in worship by members of the German Speaking Protestant Congregation.

Surprised

The service is the idea of St. Andrews minister the Rev. Andrew Wyllie.

Last night he said : "After 40 years I am surprised that a service of this sort has never been done."

He added that it was foolish to preserve animosity for ever.

Pastor Hake Schroedr, minister of the German church, said: "I was delighted when Mr. Wylie approached me about the service and the members of my congregation were very pleased when they heard about it.

"It is right that we should make contact with Scottish groups and Scottish church workers."

Imaginative

The Rev. William Johnston, convenor of the Kirk's Inter-Church Relations Committee, also backed the service.

"It is a very imaginative thing to do to bring these two congregations together after all these years," he said.

Wing Commander John Pollington, deputy general secretary of the British Legion in Scotland commented : "It is a welcome move. After all we are Nato allies.

Visitors from Malawi Alison Campbell

Rev Dr Billy Gama and his wife Shamim spent 5 days in Edinburgh in October on a visit organised by StAGW. Dr Gama is the new Head of Mission at Mulanje Mission Station, and works alongside Dr Ruth Shakespeare, our missionary partner and the Medical Director of Mulanje Mission Hospital. Ruth was also with us for the weekend and it was such a joy to see her again.

Billy, Shamim and Ruth took part in services with us and at St Cuthbert's and attended many events including a meeting with the Africa Committee of World Mission, a very informative meeting in the Undercroft (where we also welcomed Alastair Nelson of Linda's Fund) a meeting of the Livingstonia/Blantyre Fellowship, a trip to the David Livingstone Centre in Blantyre, and a lively ceilidh. They were endlessly energetic and keen to listen as well as talk – only defeated by a very lively Strip the Willow at the ceilidh!

Our support

Ruth said that our donations in several areas had been of great help. Pearson Soka, the Hospital Administrator, is about to finish his MBA and hopes to come to Scotland on a 3 month scholarship next year to a local hospital. A weekly clinic has been started in the local prison. Solar panels have been installed for the men and women's wards and thanks to Jer Ryder Jones, our joiner, an insulated ceiling has been put on the baby nursery.

Continuing needs

However the needs remain enormous. In particular we heard about the challenges facing the secondary school from Mrs Gama who teaches there – no flush toilets, one book to 5 students, shortage of teachers mainly because of a lack of houses for them, 4 students to a desk etc.

Dr Gama spoke of the increasing need for support for all aspects of the Mission – health work, schools and the prison. He is clearly an outstanding person with a formidable grasp of the problems and possible solutions in Mulanje, and a fearless honesty about the difficulties that Malawi faces, not least in accountability and openness.

How we can help

We will shortly produce a plan for further fundraising and hope to work with Stockbridge Church, our Together partners and Fortrose Academy and schools elsewhere to produce significant amounts of continuing help for all aspects of Mulanje Mission. Meanwhile we continue our 3 year funding for the prison health work.



Time... and all that jazz Laura Shepherd muses

One Sunday morning recently – and certainly not for the first time – Ian preached an excellent, and very telling, sermon. We were considering the best uses of the precious gift of the time that God has given us. I nodded eagerly to myself when Ian mentioned lists to written regularly. "I do that!" I thought, almost smugly....

Until I realised that there is a world of difference between Ian's lists and mine. He adheres faithfully to his nightly-written list of tasks-to-do, because he's a quietly well-ordered man; I do nothing of the sort! Oh, for sure, some tasks on my list are ticked off and scored out. But many of them remain undone and are added to the next day's list until my conscience pains me so much, that they just disappear altogether, never to reappear on another list.

But I heard another homily that morning. I was finishing a wake-up cup of coffee and listening to Radio 4 before setting off for George Street in the bus. The Morning Service was broadcast from a little town in Wales and it was their annual Jazz Festival service. The minister mentioned the late, great George Shearing, who had sat at his piano and announced to the audience "Now, I'd like to start with Beethoven's Moonlight Sonata And see where we go from there!" And go from there he did, playing the most wonderful variations on the beautiful theme of the first movement.

"And that," said the preacher, "is jazz – God's gift to us.

He went on to say that, of course, in life we must have plans. We need some structure to mould our lives around. "But" he added "We must also be ready for when plans go awry and life lands us with situations undreamt of. That's where we can take lessons from jazz and with God's help be ready, like George Shearing, with some improvisations. And often such improvisations are amazingly clever and at least as good as the original theme."

Perhaps, after all, the keynote is flexibility and not strict, rigid order. Now, there's a plan!



We are about to start reading Richard Holloway's Looking into the Distance: The Human Search for Meaning. New members always welcome!



Flower Fund – an update Catherine Reid

Following our appeal for the Flower Fund in September we are making good progress. Thanks to all who have contributed so far. If you are still thinking about supporting the fund, or considering it for the first time, please read on.

In June 2011 the Flower Group only numbered five people. There was an appeal for help and, after some gentle persuasion, the group increased to seventeen ladies, which was a very good response.

Each person on the list buys her own flowers and arranges them each weekend. This has been the practice for the past twenty years. However, now, encouraged by our Minister, we should like to go one step further and have a Flower Fund, supported by the Congregation. We should like to have flowers in the entrance, which makes it look more welcoming. We should like to be able to plan special flowers for special occasions. A flower fund could help to cover the cost of Oasis and other flower arranging requirements.

Most churches have a system whereby money for flowers can be given to the Flower Fund as a general donation. Alternatively donations can be earmarked for special days. If you have a special date on your calendar you may wish to arrange your own flowers; alternatively someone on the flower list would be delighted to do this on your behalf.

I think most people would agree that flowers each week do greatly enhance our beautiful building – to the glory of God.

As the Church of Scotland's Social Care Council, CrossReach's offers the best possible support to the people who use its services across Scotland. They are keen to encourage a closer connection with the wider Church, and greater local church involvement in supporting its mission.

There are over 70 Cross Reach services across Scotland. Here are some of their projects

The **Sunflower Garden** is a CrossReach project in our parish, which supports children affected by addiction in their families.

Rainbow House supports people recovering from addiction.

The Daisy Chain Early Years Project uses play-based interventions to improve the lives of vulnerable children in Govanhill.

The recent **partnership between Cameron House**, which offers enhanced support for people who have dementia, and their **local Gaelic primary school (Bun Sgoil Gàidhlig Inbhir Nis)**, giving Gaelic speaking residents the opportunity to informally chat with the participating children, was awarded "Best Innovation in continuing care" in September 2014 at Scotland's Dementia Awards.

Cunningham House, a hostel on Edinburgh's Cowgate, supports people to find their own place to stay.

Based in the same building, **the Rankeillor Initiative** supports people who are in recovery from substance misuse by for example, offering supported accommodation to people when they move on from residential rehabilitation programmes.

We pray you will be inspired by what CrossReach is doing in local communities across Scotland, and we encourage you to be part of it. On Sunday 2 November more information will be available – in CrossReach week leaflets which are being provided for every Church of Scotland parish.

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

Light against Darkness: An Exhibition of Syrian Refugee Children's Art Alison Bruce

At first glance the drawings look charming.

Blue sky. Sunshine. Soft colours.

But look closer and a different picture emerges. Here, a tank fires at a human



A century after the "Great War for Civilisation", the atrocities of war are alive and kicking. While WW1 war wasted a generation of European youth, the current conflict in Syria, Palestine and throughout the Middle East is also creating a lost generation of children and young people impoverished by war and ready to be radicalised by rival factions.




But as you move further through this exhibition – there are 160 paintings, made over a period of months by children in a refugee camp working with professional artists – the darkness begins to lift.

Families reunite, grannies smile, little girls dress up as princesses

and flowers bloom. In this created world, evil does not have the last word.

Can making art offer a different path? Can it transcend a dark reality and transform broken lives into something beautiful?






The great artist Henri Matisse made his best and simplest work at the end of his life. His paper cut outs, enjoyed by over half a million people at the Tate Modern in London this summer, radiate joy and movement. Yet much of this uplifting work was born out of darkness as the occupying German army requisitioned his house and as his health failed. Creating, working with form and colour, became an act of defiance.

So at this time of year when we remember both the dead and the living, it is almost an act of prayer to spend some time with these paintings from Syria. It is an opportunity to reflect on the eternal coexistence of good and evil, and on how to nurture the light that overcomes darkness.

Light against Darkness: An Exhibition of Syrian Refugee Children's Art runs until 12 November, Monday - Friday. 10am -3pm at the City of Edinburgh Methodist Church, Nicolson Square with outposts at Edinburgh University Chaplaincy, Bristo Square and St John's Church, Princes St.

The exhibition is organised by Edinburgh Peace and Justice Centre with Children's War Museum and Najda Now, supported by World Mission Council of Church of Scotland, Edinburgh City Centre Churches Together and Just Festival.

Dealing with Dementia Nick Evans

"I get confused"...."My memory is terrible these days". With these words, Dorothy began to give us an insight into her dementia as she starred in a short play during the 11.00 Service on Sunday 31st August. Of course, she was a fictional character, but many of us know someone with dementia, and many more of us will do so in the future. Over 70,000 people in Scotland will be living with dementia by next year, including people in their thirties and forties.

As a member of a welcoming and inclusive congregation, you and I will meet people with dementia. Some of them will be members as well.

How should we react?

The other star of the play, Abigail, reacted by smiling, giving her name, shaking hands, welcoming Dorothy, listening, asking a few gentle questions and inviting her to have a chat over a cup of coffee. In a word, she showed Christian love for the other person.

Churches which do this have been described as "Dementia friendly churches". These churches ".....include and welcome people with dementia. They offer people with dementia respect and dignity, and promote knowledge and awareness about dementia within the local community. While people with dementia have diminished ability to think and remember, in many other ways they are like anyone else. People with dementia are loved by God and are able to enjoy a relationship with God, other people and the wider creation.

Dementia friendly churches contribute to the development of dementia friendly communities and enhance the well being of people with dementia and their family carers". (Source: Mind and Soul, *exploring Christianity and mental health*, 10 Tips for Creating Dementia Friendly Churches).

Drawing on the lessons of the play, here are some things we can do to become dementia friendly:

•Be positive about what people with dementia can do (don't make negative assumptions);

- Give support to someone with dementia as they try to make decisions;
- •Listen attentively to what a person with dementia is saying (it will make them feel valued and respected);
- •Watch what someone with dementia is saying with their body language and facial expressions;
- Avoid correcting what is said by people with dementia;
- •Always assume that people with dementia know what you are saying;
- Show people with dementia love (we all flourish when we are shown love);
- Encourage people with dementia to be creative; and
- Support everyone with dementia to worship God.

Like Dorothy, everyone with dementia has difficulty remembering what has happened and working things out. They often find themselves excluded from the roles and relationships they had with other people and the local community. Like Abigail, we can help to include them in the life of the church and the city centre community.

The Education Group will be considering how best to take forward this important topic.

Speyside Way 2014 Mary Margaret Scott

When Judy and Arthur Chapman and I set out from Aviemore Station on noon on the 15th October,



we expected to get some cold and wet weather, but in fact we were pleasantly surprised; it was mild and gloriously sunny.

Our first 17 miles took us through silver birch and pine forests, across heather moors and along disused railway lines to Boat of Garten – we were lucky to see the Strathspey Railway steam train carrying its enthusiasts from Aviemore – then Nethy Bridge and on to Grantown. Our first night's accommodation was a bunkhouse run by the Craggan Outdoor Centre in Grantown with, fortunately, a co-op store near at hand to stock up on breakfast and lunch supplies for the next day.

Day 2 was a 14½ mile stretch to Cromdale and Ballindalloch Station. Much of the track was through beautiful pine woodland, although there was some agricultural land outside Cromdale. This part of the route was notable for the number of squeeze gates we had to negotiate, sometimes as many as three together.

We also had a couple of steep-ish climbs but the views across the Spey Valley made it worthwhile. Our accommodation that night was a fabulous bed-and-breakfast place, run by a retired couple from Somerset. They ferried us to and from the station and also to and from a hotel for dinner. As for the breakfast!! Day 3 saw us walk 12 miles to Aberlour and Craigellachie all along a disused railway line right beside the Spey. We passed several distilleries but none of them was open to the public, so there was no temptation! A pleasant lunch stop at Aberlour gave us time to get supplies again, before the 2 miles to our next overnight stop ion Craigellachie. Again this was a good B&B with views across to the Thomas Telford Bridge. We visited the Fiddichside Pub – a tiny pub run, in what seemed to be the living room of his house, by an 80+ year-old man. His 'till' was a drawer in the counter.

"Walking is man's best medicine" Hippocrates Our final day should have been 18 miles to Spey Bay, but as the Chapmans had to get a train back from Inverness that evening, we decided to end the walk at Fochabers, although I went on to complete the last 5 miles on the 20th. This section started

through a magnificent beech and birch wood but then climbed steeply again to enter a large pine forest. From here we caught our first glimpse of the Moray Firth and had our hardest and most sustained climb.

We also had our first real rain – a 15 minute downpour just as we stopped for lunch. We were very grateful to my sister and brother-in-law for meeting us at Fochabers, taking us to Elgin and refreshing us before the Chapmans left for the Inverness bus.



Highlights of the walk for me had to be the weather, the scenery and the Ballindalloch B&B! No blisters, but a few bruises remain.
