Raise Your Spirits by Singing Some Spirituals.... Ian Gilmour

Having completed a period of study leave in the United States including a series of interviews, I am now ready to share some of the stories gathered on the relationship between slavery and song. Thanks again to all at St Andrew's and St George's West who helped make this possible.

Come along and sing - it will raise your spirits and your awareness of that peculiar institution which was slavery. Incidentally, February is Black History month in the United States, to which one of the interviewees quipped, "It was no surprise to the black community that they gave us the shortest, coldest month!" Slavery is a terrible stain on the story of the world community, yet it continues worldwide to this day and not always in far flung locations.

At the event, our choir will sign two new pieces, one of which was specially commissioned from Andrew Carvel. Stephen Fischbacher of Fischy Music will engage us with his lively version of 'We Shall Overcome', while the Edinburgh Signing Choir will also present some fresh material. The audience will get a chance to sing some of these wonderful melodies which hugely influenced the Jazz, Gospel and Blues genres throughout the 20th century. This music was first brought to Edinburgh in the early 1870s by the Fisk Jubilee singers who were former slaves and able to give first-hand insights into their experience of slavery. Some 6,000 songs were written during the period of enslavement in the USA.

You will hear a dozen of the slave songs (you may know more of them than you thought) sung by some wonderful voices including internationally renowned mezzo, Andrea Baker. Her relative, Professor Undine Moore (1904–1989), arranged one of the pieces which she will perform. The songs, which were written during the three centuries of American slavery, were not all sorrowful - in fact many of them are lively. They describe the rhythms of African life, honesty about hardship, hope of a better life on this earth and in the life to come, the desire for escape and freedom and some have hidden humour and secret messages.

The event will take place in the church at 7.30pm on Thursday 19 February, tickets £5 (£3 concessions) including refreshments. The evening will be filmed so that the Americans who were interviewed will be able to see how I used their contributions. Hope to see you there.

statement signed on behalf of the congregation by Ian Gilmour

Recently we witnessed the very tragic events in Paris. As faith communities at such times more than ever it is important that we stand strong together recognising that these acts have nothing to do with religion but are senseless acts of violence. The last thing we would want to see are today's events leading to further acts of violence and a rise in Islamaphobic incidents. In response Edinburgh Interfaith Association would like to issue the following statement.

"The senselessness of the acts of murder in Paris yesterday is shocking. That they were carried out supposedly in the name of God only increases that sense of futility and outrage. Words cannot express the horror of such acts, nor do justice to the sense in which this was an attack upon, and betrayal of, so much that we hold dear. Edinburgh Interfaith Association stands in solidarity alongside the people of Paris gathered in the Place de la Republique in their refusal to allow this violent act to have the final word. Neither will we allow it to define our view of Islam. We assert that the future for our world, and for religions, will be found in respect for others, dialogue through freedom of expression, and collective action that seeks the wellbeing and flourishing of all." This statement was supported by a broad network of religious Leaders, faith representatives and community members.

Christmas Eve in Bethlehem

This letter came by email from someone who was a pupil of mine at Tabeetha School Jaffa, Israel, long ago. Our congregation has links with Tabeetha, owned and supported by the Church of Scotland. Mary Godden also taught there and the Dunlop family's children were pupils. We have given a donation towards improvements to the school in the past. Tabeetha is an amazing school, where pupils of many different nationalities and faiths co-exist, working and playing together, and learning that 'under the skin' they are all just human beings. It doesn't surprise me that this Jewish former pupil is involved in interfaith relations.

Last night I was in Bethlehem for Christmas Eve with some religious Sisters who are friends. At 3 am, when we entered, the little town of Bethlehem was strewn with street lights, mainly featuring the 'star' but otherwise completely empty of its sleeping inhabitants. Here and there one could see large groups of pilgrims walking from Jerusalem towards the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem. This is the time for those of us who do not have invitations for the Midnight Mass (meant basically for the local Bethlehem Christians) to enter the crowded church.

The familiar words of the Mass were recited everywhere within the church in different languages and the inner light that emanated from the faces of the pilgrims was inspiring. I was amazed to see groups of Indian Christians who had come all the way to be here this very night.

I do not know how many Jewish Israelis might have been there that night; perhaps very few, perhaps none at all. Christmas night is the only night when Jewish Israelis can enter the Palestinian Authority. Though many Israelis are interested in Christmas, there is fear and suspicion always – but certainly these days. I too who work for Jewish-Arab coexistence, had to overcome fear in order to use the rare opportunity to enter Bethlehem legally and not be caught at the checkpoint as a trespasser.

Of course the deep question is how is there going to be peace without trust and how is there going to be trust without people getting to know each other...

Mulanje Mission

Dr Ruth Shakespeare has written to thank the congregation for our support of Mulanje Mission Hospital's work in the prison. "We decided in December that the work to improve the toilets at the prison was so urgent that we should allocate funds to that. In June 2014 you remitted £1850 for this work. This has been spent as follows:

nitial purchase of equipment and supplies for the prison clinic	
	£ 635
Monthly running expenses for the clinic to January	
	£ 240
Repair and rebuilding of toilets	
	£ 813

This leaves a balance of £162 which will be sufficient to run the clinics until May 2015. I think this has been a very successful addition to our primary care outreach, and it is hugely appreciated by the prison staff and inmates."

Since Ruth's email, Malawi has been affected by severe flooding in Mulanje and a number of other areas across the country. It is reported at least 48 people have been killed and 69,000 have been forced from their homes. President Mutharika is appealing for international assistance to help with this emergency. Our thoughts and prayers are with all those impacted by the terrible flooding.

An urgent response is necessary to save lives and stop the spread of disease.

The power supply is erratic and they are relying upon their generator to keep the hospital functioning. They need basic medical supplies to deal with their increased caseload.

Toilets have collapsed in the area; rebuilding these is an urgent public health priority.

The hospital is already seeing more cases of diarrhoea and are preparing in case of a cholera outbreak. Rebuilding these toilets is essential to prevent the spread of disease.

An extract from the CrossReach Presbytery Information sheet for December.

The Moderator of the General Assembly Rt. Rev. John Chalmers reflects on CrossReach Week.

Having spent a week with CrossReach (the Church of Scotland's Social Care Council), I witnessed some of the dedicated and high quality work being done across Scotland in the name of Jesus Christ. The most meaningful and inspiring social care services are those driven by the people who are being supported - like Heart for Art, CrossReach's innovative creative arts classes for people living with dementia. The artwork produced is impressive, but

even more impressive is the community spirit, self-confidence and the joy of those taking part. Their artwork is indisputable evidence that dementia is not the end - we must never write people off; dementia does not destroy the wonderful talents that are still to be released.

This message was reinforced by Sally Magnusson, who told us: "It's wonderful to discover that CrossReach and Playlist for Life are doing exactly the same thing which is celebrating the individual – the person inside somebody with dementia remains that person till the very end of their life – and can be brought back." Two men being supported through Cunningham House and the Rankeillor Initiative in Edinburgh told me that homelessness and addiction takes away everything. Time has been a great healer for Matthew and George - they have been able to build trusting relationships with staff over many months. I've realised the way back from a place of despair is a long, slow process requiring patience and persistence, and I've seen that patience and persistence in the staff of CrossReach.

It is enormously frustrating that social care funding is often determined by political expediency rather than the long-term need to make a difference in people's lives. We in the Church must draw on the practical experience of CrossReach to challenge this situation.

Lords Prayer, from the original Aramaic

Translation by Neil Douglas-Klotz in Prayers of the Cosmos

The meeting of the Kirk Session 18 January 2015

Arising from a suggestion by one of the elders, the Kirk Session met during the afternoon. There were practical issues to consider including a report on the necessary process of replacing the central heating boiler, which requires agreement from Session and approval from Presbytery due to the substantial costs involved. If all goes to plan, work should start at the end of May 2014.

Anne Wilson, the Roll Keeper, always meticulous in her recordkeeping, reported on changes in membership over the previous year. James McNeill explained the time sequence for the Stewardship campaign planned to begin in early spring. Crispin Longden presented, and answered questions on, the Budget for 2015 and pointed the way forward for the two succeeding years. At present it is anticipated that running costs continue to exceed our annual income (although we have benefited in 2014 from generous legacies), but a steady improvement is anticipated, through a combination of careful stewardship and generation of income through the café and lettings.

The Session took time to review our congregation's activities during 2014 – the many positives included music, the school debates, the quality of food in the café, the warm welcome at the church door throughout the week, the volunteers at the Christian Aid Sale.. the tremendous contribution of so many volunteers. Areas where improvements could be made were also identified and will help to inform our work in 2015.

Reflection: Optimism to Inspire Others



An Excerpt from **Peacework: Prayer, Resistance, Community** by *Henri Nouwen* taken from the Peace and Justice News December 2014

"Here we touch one of the greatest dangers that face peacemakers: that peacemakers themselves become the victims of the evil forces they are trying to overcome. The same fear of 'the enemy' that leads warmakers to war can begin to affect the peacemaker who sees the warmaker as 'the enemy.' Words of anger and hostility can gradually enter into the language of the peacemaker. Even the sense of urgency and emergency that motivates the arms race can become the driving force behind the peacemaker. Then indeed the strategy of war and the strategy of peace have become the same, and peacemaking has lost its heart.

"One of the reasons why so many people have developed strong reservations about the peace movement is precisely that they do not see the peace they seek in the peacemakers themselves. Often what they see are fearful and angry people trying to convince others of the urgency of their protest. The tragedy is that peacemakers often reveal more of the demons they are fighting than of the peace they want to bring about.

"The words of Jesus go right to the heart of our struggle: 'Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly' (Lk 6: 27-28). The more I reflect on these words, the more I consider them to be the test for peacemakers. What my enemies deserve is not my anger, rejection, resentment, or disdain, but my love. Spiritual guides throughout history have said that love for the enemy is the cornerstone of the message of Jesus and the core of holiness."
