Loyalty and Lent - from the minister

Have you notice that all sorts of companies and organisations offer loyalty cards these days? They use words like **bonus**, **advantage** and **privilege**, and much care is devoted to devising these schemes, always to find an edge over some competitors.

My friend Bill Clinkenbeard brought this fact to my attention and also to the consequences. Waitrose my corner shop in Comely Bank offers free newspaper plus a coffee if you spend more than £10 on a visit, but you must sign up for their brand card. It does attract many customers who read and sup contentedly. Some companies go further offering small prizes to Caribbean cruises or if you sign up and collect enough points. There are two problems, one is you often have to give your mobile phone number and via a smart phone the firm is able to detect when you are their store and where you are in the store to within a few feet. Card owners are being monitored and your purchases analysed. It will happen with SMART television also, allowing people to be targeted with the most suitable adverts according to the analysis. This reduces freedom for the individual and I, for one, am not keen on constant monitoring. Secondly the drive is for the consumer to spend more time and more money in fewer shops and the local newsagents in Comely Bank will not last long if everyone uses their privileges and gets their papers and coffee at Waitrose. I refuse to have a Nectar, Boots nor any privilege card for these reasons.

Jesus did not operate like this; in fact, quite the reverse. When Jesus disciples asked what reward they would receive for their loyalty, he promised them the *dis*-incentives of suffering and persecution. Jesus did not disguise the costliness of discipleship. He modelled it and promoted it, saying, "This...is not the way it should be among you. If one of you wants to be great, they must be the servant of all."

There is no loyalty card for following Jesus through Lent, but it can lead to a change in attitude towards self, to others, to the globe and to God. Please consider where you loyalty lies?

Christian Aid Week is the time when 20,000 churches join together to represent Christian Aid. Last year £12 million was raised by this alliance of which we were part. In this, the forty-second year of the Sale, we will have another great opportunity to raise funds at this church in the centre of the Scottish capital which is perfectly situated for the purpose.

The quest for a new patron each year is always a pleasure and we are proud to announce that Lord Smith of Kelvin, Knight of the Thistle, has agreed to support our 2015 endeavour. Among the special books this year were two about the Order of the Thistle, Scotland's premier Order of Chivalry founded in 1687 by James VII. Our Special Books Convener proposed that these should be offered directly to the latest Scot awarded this honour, that is, Lord Smith of Kelvin. Thus Lord Smith acquired these two books from us, and agreed to be our patron for 2015. I would like the donor of these books to hear this story.

As a commentator of the day has recently said: "the figure 15 is a date that seems to leave marks big enough to be celebrated hundreds of years later". One thinks of Magna Carta in 1215, Agincourt in 1415 and Waterloo in 1815. There was the first Jacobite rising in 1715, then the "Forty-Five", the Young Pretender's uprising 270 years ago. On 30 January the funeral of Sir Winston Churchill was commemorated. Let us hope that our History and Biography section will reflect all this.

For our Literature Section too there are important centenaries to mark. Anthony Trollope was born in 1815 and we hope that for his bicentenary we will have editions of all his books, especially those now out of print. Already in store for the Sale is a set of his Barsetshire novels which has been bequeathed to us by a member of the Religious Books Team who died last year. We would be thrilled if we were to be presented with a fine copy of Alice in Wonderland, first published 180 years ago. It was fifty years ago that T S Eliot died and the Literature team will be hoping to have many editions of his poetry.

Our Religious Books Team will have an opportunity to honour the memory of the legendary Scottish missionary, Mary Slessor. It would be good to have for sale some copies of the classic biography Mary Slessor of Calabar so that the modern generation could be made aware of the achievement of this revered Scottish heroine who sailed from Dundee to Southern Nigeria in 1876, to face a land ravaged by the slave trade and where human sacrifice and cannibalism were common practice.

Up in the organ gallery the Science Team will be remembering that this is the 150th anniversary of the publication of James Clerk Maxwell's ground-breaking theory of electromagnetism and also that it is 100 years since Einstein produced his general theory of relativity.

Our Sale of Pictures will have an anniversary of its own, for it was 10 years ago that John Bellany was our inspiring patron and benefactor. We hope that his widow, Helen, will attend the Sale.

Being Different: A Question of Identity

Some years ago as part of Remembrance Sunday, I talked about refugees and asylum seekers. This year, around the time of Holocaust Memorial week, two unconnected incidents have prompted me to say some more about being Jewish by race, and as a refugee, about always being different.

Some of you may know that my sister Marianne and I came to Britain by Kindertransport as refugees from Nazi Germany. Since we were third generation Christians, the family experienced what it meant to be Jewish by race only when Hitler's edicts began to affect us. Just as in the 1960s the US Jim Crow laws classified a person as Negro if he/she had even one black ancestor going back to the fourth generation, having a Jewish surname (Friedenthal) was enough to classify my family. In Berlin, my parents were part of the Confessing Church which opposed Hitler's laws. It was a church organisation which helped some of my family to escape in the early forties. Because we were not Jews by faith, the Jewish agencies were not available to us.

Before 1938 I had been at a state school. My parents vetted the birthday parties I could go to. They decided I should not go to the house of a prominent government official and did not allow me to get an attractive Hitler Youth jersey, which I coveted as "everyone was wearing one". No reasons were given for these embargos. When somebody at school called out, "Your father is a Jew", I answered, "Oh no he's not, he's a lawyer!" This was the measure of my ignorance.

With hindsight, I wish our parents had not protected us so much or had explained more. When my sister and were forced to go to a Jewish School, we were again different. It was only then that we began to hear what was happening to Jews (although we still didn't identify with being Jewish). Our mother had not told us that our father had spent time in one of the early concentration camps and was only released on condition that he left the country immediately. We followed him to Switzerland, by which time the family was stateless and did not belong anywhere. When I arrived in England, aged 12, having been sponsored by an elderly lady in Britain, all I wanted was to be like the other girls at school and to belong. However when war broke out, my name suggested I was an enemy, whatever my circumstances. My headmistress started calling me 'Ray' (instead of Renate), which I felt at home with since my mother had often called me that. I kept a very low profile and had few friends of my own age.

My parents miraculously escaped to England and spent the war years partly on the Isle of Man as Enemy Aliens, interned alongside Jews and Nazi sympathisers. Although this was a very difficult time, what mattered to us was that they were alive.

I shall always be grateful that I was so fortunate compared with so many other Jewish children and was given asylum, a good secondary education and a scholarship to London University. By that time I felt very much that I belonged, and I celebrated when I was old enough to become a naturalised British citizen.

Work took me to Scotland and again I was different - educated in England, by now with an English accent and brought up as an Anglican. But to many Scots I was just German - the one identity I had rejected entirely. Yet to this day, being German and being Jewish have continued to be labels applied to me by other people. When I married Richard I started a new life with a new name. For some of the Foreign Mission officials I was suspect – different again but this time because I was not Presbyterian!

Why am I telling you this now?

It has taken me until my eighties to accept my differences and that these do not only relate to my origins. This concerns all of us as we try to live in this multi-faith, multi-cultural world.

The Edinburgh Easter Play is set to mark its tenth year



with a radical new perspective on the Easter story. Scripted by writer and journalist Susan Mansfield, this year's performance casts the spotlight on some women and men in the margins of the Bible, as the story of Jesus' death and resurrection is seen through the eyes of the often overlooked characters around him. Seen from the point of view of wives and daughters, soldiers and siblings, the play offers an idea of the way in which Jesus affected the lives of the ordinary people around him.

First staged in 2005, the Edinburgh Easter Play has grown into a large-scale community production, with a cast and crew of volunteers drawn from groups all across the city. Last year's performance drew crowds of up to 2500 people, one of the largest audiences the production has enjoyed in its ten year history. www.easterplay.org

Covenant Sunday 22 March

Duncan Forrester – Living and Loving the Mystery

"Although we often speak of worship as 'celebration' it's usually solemnity that is stressed rather than joy and playfulness. 'What if worship is a kind of play – the joyful play of the kingdom of God?' It's too easy to regard 'liturgy (the *work* of God's people), as ... a way of striving to earn God's approval'. In order to recover the 'proper Christian emphasis on grace and the love of God, we should expect enjoyment and delight, even playfulness, in worship' whilst still taking evil and sin seriously.

Slavery and Song

A brilliant evening!

Over 300 people packed the church on 19 February for Slavery and Song, a superb programme of words, music and images put together by Ian Gilmour following his study time last year in the USA.

The music ranged from the familiar, rich voice of Paul



Robeson, to a specially-commissioned new arrangement of spirituals, written by Andrew Carvel and sung by the church choir. Andrea Baker was the guest soloist - her spine-tingling voice was a particular highlight in an evening of many talents including our own Frances Cooper and Stuart Mitchell. We heard stories from the life of Booker T Washington, and examples of slavery still existing in the modern world. The Edinburgh Signing Choir were a real treat to watch, and we saw testimony on film from people interviewed by Ian during his study time – notable people whose ancestors had been enslaved. We learned about the Underground Railway, the escape route for fleeing slaves, and about secret, coded directions to safe houses, sewn into patchwork quilts. And we joined in singing some of the most familiar of the many spirituals, their words using imagery from the Bible to express a deep longing for freedom and justice.



Slavery and Song was truly an evening of information, inspiration and entertainment, and the audience appreciation was loud and long.
