Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

A very special welcome to our ecumenical siblings from St Andrew's & St George's West and St Cuthbert's who join us for this combined city centre service. And a very special welcome also to today's preacher: the Revd Dr Rosie Magee, Minister of St Andrew's & St George's West. This is an annual event - only interrupted in the past two years because of the global pandemic. Today's presider is the Revd Eileen Thompson, a member of the Ministry Team of St John's. Eileen was ordained presbyter in the Church of South India, a Christian community in full communion/full altar- and pulpit fellowship with both the Church of Scotland and the Scottish Episcopal Church. It is good to come together and worship as one the one God with whom we are for ever united in the one baptism. Welcome!

Communion

Holy Eucharist (aka "The Lord's Supper" or "Holy Communion") is a timeless act of intimate union: It link us to other members of the universal Church past, present, and yet to come. It equally unites us unspeakably close with God, as we are drawn into the birth, life, teaching, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ through the grace of God manifested in the Eucharist. In bread and wine, Christ gives himself fully (body and blood) as food for our journey into God's eternity, as nourishment for the ministry to which God calls us, and as a sacrifice to renew God's salvation in us: "My flesh is food indeed, and my body is drink indeed," (John 6:55). By partaking of Christ's body and bloody we claim for ourselves God's liberating, sin-forgiving, evil-destroying, death-conquering, justice-creating, peace-proclaiming, creation-affirming and life-giving power and love. Having said this, Holy Eucharist remains a mystery, never fully comprehend in this life. Holy Eucharist is celebrated by and for the baptised members of the Body of Christ. You do not need to be Episcopalian to receive communion. Come, "taste and see that the Lord is good" (Psalm 34:8). Communion will be administered in your pew. Please stay in your seats; we will come to you. A drop of wine has been applied to each wafer before the service. You will therefore receive communion in both kinds. Gluten-free communion wafers are available; please let us know.

If you are making a donation today and are a UK tax payer please consider using one of the gift aid envelopes which you will find at the end of each pew. Pandemic restrictions do not allow us to collect a donation within the service. There will be an opportunity to give as you leave the church through the porch.

After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, Holy Father, protect [those whom you gave me from the world] in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one. Sermon

Renewal of the Baptismal Covenant

The Christian life means turning from evil and turning to Christ. Standing now with Christ, do you renew your commitment to renounce evil? I renounce evil.
